Church To Celebrate The 200th Birthday Of The Sanctuary Building from Mac Sanders

On Saturday and Sunday, October 15 and 16, our congregation and the Fort Miller community will celebrate the 200th birthday of our sanctuary. The History of Washington County, N.Y. (1878) states that "the meeting house of this church (i.e. the Fort Miller Reformed Church) is the oldest place of worship in the town (of Fort Edward), it having been built in 1816 ... upon a lot given by Barent and John Bleecker." A local carpenter, Shepard Norcross, built our meeting house/sanctuary (presumably with the assistance of a construction crew). The local community raised \$1,500 to fund this construction. In 1822 a "Reformed Protestant Dutch" church was organized. Except for a 14 year interruption (1853-67), a Reformed church congregation has worshipped in our sanctuary, a total of 180 years of history and tradition.

A committee, comprised of consistory and congregational members, started meeting in February to plan the events for this 2-day celebration. While the plans are not yet finalized, the program for Saturday will focus upon the history of our area and the role that our meeting house/sanctuary played in the development of our community. The congregation, community and political leaders will be invited to participate in the program that day. Following our program, we will host a luncheon with a birthday cake celebrating our sanctuary's 200th birthday. On Sunday we will hold a traditional Dutch worship service with a liturgy and sermon that will be appropriate to 1816.

Plan to join us for an interesting and fun weekend.

FORT MILLER REFORMED CHURCH CONSISTORY REPORT FOR THE PATRIOT

If the Fort Miller Reformed Church was a ship, it could be said that, thankfully, we have navigated into calmer waters after the 2014/15 year of stormy seas. I don't think anything illustrates that fact more than comparing the minutes of the Consistory meetings of March 26, 2015 to the one we recently held on March 31, 2016.

The minutes of the March 2015 meeting reflect the turmoil we Consistory members felt as we faced the departure of our presiding interim pastor, along with the loss of many long-time and cherished members of the Consistory and the Church.

What a difference a year makes!! At the Consistory meeting held on March 31, 2016, we voted on and passed our new mission statement. It states, "Our mission is to be an all welcoming Church to spread God's word of faith, hope, love, and support in Jesus' name." At the recent (and harmonious) Consistory meeting, we voted to extend Rev. Rich Hoffman's contract as our interim minister for a year up to March 31, 2017. We will continue with Rev. Hoffman preaching twice a month and Doug Vincent and Jamie Grubb each preaching once a month. We are fortunate that they have been so dedicated to this Church. Doug and Jamie have been with us almost from the beginning when our need for preachers arose. We love to hear their sermons; consequently, our attendance rate has held steady. Rev. Hoffman, who came to us in the fall, is an ordained minister recognized by the Reformed Church of America. As our

spiritual leader, Rev. Hoffman represents our Church in many ways such as at the Greater Schuylerville Ministerial Association meetings. He enables this Church to offer our Congregation the full spectrum of services one expects from a church such as communion, Christian counseling, and visitation of the ill and elderly in their homes and hospital rooms. We have someone who can share in our joys such as weddings and baptisms, and he can comfort us at funeral/memorial services of our loved ones, as with the recent passings of Adam Shostak and Jean Gaylord. With the help of our "ministerial team", in a year, we have managed to create a new norm for our Church with which, hopefully, we all feel comfortable. Special thanks to Rev. Hoffman, Doug, and Jamie.

To further illustrate what a difference a year makes, the March 2015 Consistory minutes reflect we were just beginning the renovation of the sanctuary. The minutes refer to picking out a paint color for the walls, and finding volunteers to pull up the old carpet. A year later, our sanctuary looks beautiful, with newly painted walls and ceiling, renovated floors, and beautiful aisle runners. We no longer have to worry about water leaks (remember the pail in the corner), because they have been fixed as well. Thanks to Mac for all his hard work making sure things got done.

Finally, the balance on hand in our checking account on March 25, 2015 was \$5,448.15. The balance on hand on March 31, 2016 was \$6,447.14. We have managed to stay in the black throughout this year in spite of the fact that we lost members and did a big renovation on the Church building. We are blessed.



Historic Churches of Washington County

Worship in Washington County: Fundraiser and Guided Bus Tour

An interpretive bus tour entitled "God's Architecture" will be conducted on May 14, 2016, from 10 am to 3 pm. All proceeds will benefit Washington County Historical Association. The bus location will be either Salem Central School or Fort Miller Reformed Church. The cost of the tour will be \$40 for WCHS members and \$55 to non-members. The tour will focus on five historic houses of worship: the two Society of Friends meetinghouses in Easton, both of which portray the architecture of the Quakers; the Fort Miller Reformed Church, 1816, a highly intact example of the meetinghouse type located in the historic Fort Miller hamlet; the Coila Presbyterian Church, a handsome brick building erected in 1834; and the First United Presbyterian Church of Salem, ca. 1797. Join WCHS for this unique opportunity to celebrate the region's religious and architectural history.

The Vereenigheit Circle News from Tina De Jong

The Vereenigheit Women's Circle may take on a new shape. While the mission remains to provide financial support to the Church, the Circle is finding new life in involving the men of the congregation in its various activities. With this may come a new name, but it will still retain its underlying meaning of unity and friendship. This past year the Circle sponsored numerous events. They sold Strawberry Shortcake at Whipple City Days, served luncheon to the Washington County Historical Society as part of their 75th anniversary celebration, had a pork roast dinner, and enjoyed their annual Christmas social, at the Greenwich Cafe. Funds raised by the Circle's events are used to assist with the Church's fuel bills, scholarships for summer camp, the Neil Sanders scholarship, improvements to the Church facility, and various benevolences.

Sanctuary Repairs and Improvements (Almost) Completed from Mac Sanders

From March through November, 2015 we completed significant repairs and improvements to our sanctuary:

- During the severe 2014/15 winter, we experienced water damage to the ceiling and walls in the northwest corner of the sanctuary. Starting in March, the damaged plaster was removed and repairs were made.
- •The sanctuary roof was repaired, i.e. the valley between the sanctuary and the 1896 dining room was fixed and new slates were installed.
- •The wall-to-wall carpet covering the sanctuary floor was removed and the hardwood flooring under the carpet was refinished and exposed. (Note: Our records show that this hardwood flooring was installed in 1924 at a cost of \$425)
- •The dining room floor was cleaned and resealed.
- •The exterior south side of the sanctuary and dining room were repainted. Spot repair and repainting was completed to other exterior portions of the sanctuary and dining room.
- •The interior of the sanctuary was repainted.
- •Two new oriental aisle-runner carpets were purchased.

The best part of this repair and improvement program was that we were able to pay for it with money on hand in our building fund. We thank all of those people who, over the years, have contributed to our building fund to make these repairs and improvements possible.

We are now planning two additional improvements. The first is replacement of the sill under our sanctuary entryway. The second is we need to provide handicapped accessibility through the front entryway and have a handicapped accessible bathroom. Perhaps we can complete both projects this year. If not, they will be completed in 2017.

A Note about Sunday School from Marylou Squires

The Sunday School presented a beautiful Christmas Program on December 20. The children made tree ornaments for the residents at Morgan's Run. For Valentine's Day, they made 150 Valentine cards for the Argyle Nursing Home and Morgan's Run. The Sunday School served the chili from the chili cook-off and the love donation of \$73.00 was earmarked for use to send children to Camp Fowler. More recently, the children made Easter baskets for Morgan's Run. We have been teaching the children how to find Bible verses independently in their Bibles.
